Competition Brief

The aim of the competition is to create a memorial which, with high artistic quality and a contemporary visual language, will commemorate the members of the Royal Air Force from the Mladá Boleslav region—pilots, their families, and ground personnel—whose destinies are bound up with the struggle for freedom. The memorial is to be not only a bearer of historical memory, but also a compelling contemporary work in the public realm, capable of engaging the public visually, emotionally, and intellectually. The competition is intended to bring a plurality of perspectives on how the theme of collective memory can be artistically mediated today, and how commemorative meaning can be translated into a site within the civilian urban landscape.

The memorial will be situated in an open setting, in direct contact with the surrounding greenery and in the vicinity of the "Metoděj Vlach Airplane" wayfinding landmark/attractor. The site is visible even from the air—this fact offers the opportunity to work with scale, composition, and symbolism in the vertical plane. The design should make use of this distinctiveness and reflect it in both the physical massing and the spatial solution.

A competition proposal may transcend the traditional model of a memorial site and offer the possibility of direct entry or interaction—physical as well as sensory. The memorial can thus become a space one can enter, traverse, or otherwise experience, on a visual, tactile, or spatial level. Such openness can enable visitors to have a personal experience and a deeper connection with the theme. It is expected that proposals will seek an original form of expression that goes beyond conventional conceptions of memorial places and delivers a contemporary, aesthetically powerful, and contextually sensitive result. What matters is the work's ability to communicate with different segments of the public—from specialists to a broad audience, from local residents to visitors to the city.

Competitors are invited to interweave the historical dimension with architectural and sculptural quality, to work with materials durable over time, to consider the memorial's visibility and perception from various distances and vantage points, and above all to create a work that will resonate enduringly with the place and its story.

Mladá Boleslav and the RAF

The memorial dedicated to Czechoslovak members of the Royal Air Force from the Mladá Boleslav region aims to dignifiedly recall the courage and sacrifices of the men and women who served during World War II. Many personalities from Mladá Boleslav and its surroundings left the country after the occupation of Czechoslovakia, joined the Allied struggle, and contributed significantly to the victory in air operations.

More than 2,400 Czechoslovak airmen served in the RAF, many of them from Central and Northern Bohemia. The Mladá Boleslav region had a tradition of aviation and technical education, linked both to local industry and to the aviation activities of Metoděj Vlach. These people often left families and homes, knowing their return was uncertain, and joined the RAF determined to fight for the freedom of their occupied homeland. Czechoslovak pilots served in well-known squadrons, such as the 310th, 311th, 312th, and 313th fighter and bomber squadrons, and took part in major operations, including the Battle of Britain in 1940. In this battle, they ranked among the most successful Allied pilots, gaining international recognition.

Their fates were often tied to heroism but also tragedy. Many fell in combat, while others, after returning home post-February 1948, were persecuted by the communist regime. The commemoration of the RAF thus has a dual dimension – honoring their heroic service abroad and recalling the difficult postwar history. Many surviving RAF members were stripped of ranks, expelled from the army, or imprisoned after 1948. Their contributions were only fully rehabilitated after 1989.

The memory of these events has been preserved in Mladá Boleslav not only through personal recollections but also through local institutions. The Metoděj Vlach Aviation Museum has long worked to document the history of Czechoslovak aviation and preserve the memory of its important representatives. The RAF memorial will be placed at the entrance to the aviation museum, linking historical context with the physical site.

Metoděj Vlach Aviation Museum – a living museum of aviation history

The Aviation Museum in Mladá Boleslav, named after Czech aviation pioneer Metoděj Vlach, offers a unique experience. Unlike traditional aviation museums, where exhibits are only for viewing, this museum is alive – most of the aircraft are airworthy replicas of historical planes.

Visitors can often witness not only careful maintenance and repairs but also ordinary operational activities such as refueling before flights. It is not uncommon to hear engines roar or watch a historic aircraft prepare for takeoff during a visit.

The exhibition provides a rare view into aviation history – from early flight attempts to interwar aircraft of the 20th century, with special emphasis on this period. Every aircraft on display is the result of precise craftsmanship and a commitment to historical accuracy. Many planes also regularly participate in airshows and public demonstrations, confirming their full operational capability.

Thus, the Metoděj Vlach Aviation Museum is not just an exhibition but a truly living museum, where the past takes off into the present.

Location

The memorial site is in front of the Metoděj Vlach Aviation Museum, near the navigation landmark "The Metoděj Vlach Airplane" – a stainless-steel construction based on original plans of a historical model.

The area is publicly accessible, connected to the parking lot, and closely linked to bus and car access to the museum. Two cycle routes run through the adjacent residential urban structure.

The design must respect height restrictions (set by surrounding buildings), engineering networks, and spatial requirements of the bus stop.

In red – plot no. 203/47 (cadastral area Chrást near Mladá Boleslav), owned by the Central Bohemian Region, administered by the Mladá Boleslav Museum, contributory organization.
